GOALS OF SPEECH THERAPY FOR TODDLERS

- FRUSTRATION OR BEHAVIORAL ISSUES RELATED TO COMMUNICATION STRUGGLES

WHEN TO SEEK A PROFESSIONAL EVALUATION

IF A TODDLER CONSISTENTLY EXHIBITS MULTIPLE SIGNS OF SPEECH DELAY, PARENTS SHOULD CONSULT A PEDIATRICIAN OR A LICENSED SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST. EARLY ASSESSMENT HELPS DETERMINE THE UNDERLYING CAUSES AND THE MOST APPROPRIATE INTERVENTION STRATEGIES.

COMMON TECHNIQUES USED IN 2 YEAR OLD SPEECH THERAPY
