CONTEXTUAL STRATEGIES FOR WORD DISCOVERY

CONTEXTUAL STRATEGIES ARE AMONG THE MOST EFFECTIVE INDEPENDENT WORD LEARNING METHODS. THEY INVOLVE USING THE SURROUNDING TEXT, SENTENCE STRUCTURE, AND DISCOURSE TO INFER THE MEANING OF UNKNOWN WORDS. THIS APPROACH EMPHASIZES READING COMPREHENSION AND CRITICAL THINKING, ALLOWING LEARNERS TO ENGAGE WITH LANGUAGE IN AUTHENTIC SITUATIONS RATHER THAN RELYING SOLELY ON MEMORIZATION.

Using Context Clues

CONTEXT CLUES PROVIDE HINTS ABOUT A WORD'S MEANING BASED ON ITS USAGE IN A SENTENCE OR PARAGRAPH. THESE CLUES CAN BE SYNONYMS, ANTONYMS, EXPLANATIONS, OR EXAMPLES EMBEDDED IN THE TEXT. Types of Context Clues

- VERIFY GUESSES LATER THROUGH DICTIONARIES OR OTHER RESOURCES.

USING MORPHOLOGICAL AWARENESS

MORPHOLOGICAL AWARENESS IS THE ABILITY TO UNDERSTAND AND MANIPULATE THE MEANINGFUL PARTS OF WORDS, SUCH AS PREFIXES, SUFFIXES, AND ROOT WORDS. IDENTIFYING WORD PARTS

Words often consist of a root or base combined with affixes that modify meaning. Recognizing these parts can reveal clues about a word's definition. For example, the prefix "un-" typically means "not," and the suffix "-able" suggests capability. Understanding these patterns allows learners to decode unfamiliar vocabulary systematically.

COMMON PREFIXES AND SUFFIXES

FAMILIARITY WITH COMMON PREFIXES AND SUFFIXES ENHANCES MORPHOLOGICAL ANALYSIS. EXAMPLES INCLUDE:

- PREFIXES: UN-, RE-, PRE-, DIS-, MIS-
