COMPONENTS OF THE TRIARCHIC THEORY

ANALYTICAL INTELLIGENCE, OFTEN EQUATED WITH ACADEMIC PROBLEM-SOLVING AND LOGICAL REASONING, INVOLVES THE

PRACTICAL INTELLIGENCE

PRACTICAL INTELLIGENCE ENABLES INDIVIDUALS TO SOLVE PROBLEMS THAT ARE NOT PURELY ACADEMIC BUT ARE CRITICAL FOR FUNCTIONING SUCCESSFULLY IN PERSONAL AND PROFESSIONAL CONTEXTS.
